The Photo Walk:

Suffolk Foray – Thursday 30th June

“Trevor (The Ford Transit Camper Van) and the Red Fire Engine (Malcolm’s Car) took five excited Shutterists out of Norfolk and into Suffolk. Leaving Watton at 09:00, firstly to Shingle Street (where Trevor’s passengers did enjoy a bacon sarnie on the way) and then onto Southwold Harbour. Returning home just after 21:00.”

Shingle Street:

*“A coastal settlement in Suffolk at the mouth of the River Ore and opposite the tip of Orford Ness. Shingle Street was originally a home for fishermen and river pilots. Early in the 19th century a Martello tower was built, which was later a home for coastguards. **Little known fact:** It was the inspiration of the Thomas Dolby song "Cloudburst at Shingle Street", from 1982”*



“Shingle Street is a photographic location whose success is built on the quality of light that is so often found here. However not necessarily on the day we visited. There’s a small free car parking but no facilities, so if you decide to visit make sure you take everything you need. Trevor kindly offered real coffee to the attending Shutterists.”



The Harbour at Southwold:

“Southwold is a small harbour with a tricky entrance and some yachting facilities lying between the river Ore to the South and Lowestoft to the North. The actual town of Southwold is about a mile north of the harbour. The harbour itself lies in the river Blyth and entrance involves negotiating a sandbar and coping with strong tidal streams. Immediately past the harbour moorings the way is blocked by a fixed bridge.

It’s not as glamorous as some other parts of Southwold but it is very picturesque, and quaint, and well worth a visit next time you’re visiting the town. The harbour is about a 40-minute walk from the pier, Southwold was once a very busy fishing port; it was recorded in the doomsday book that Southwold was a most prosperous fishing port in the 11th century. Herring being the main catch, and up until the 1914 - 18 war large numbers of people could be seen gutting the fish during the season. After the war, the sad national trend of decline, affected the markets at Southwold. So, the fishing industry isn’t what it once was, but the harbour is still packed with a healthy number of trawlers - each one doing their bit to keep the town’s rich maritime heritage alive. The Harbour is still a bustling place, and it is a most relaxing place to stroll along its shores taking a leisurely walk, where one will be fascinated by the variety of workshops and fishing commerce.”

Shanty Group:

“A few individuals have asked me whether it might be possible to form a Men’s Shed Shanty Group. For this to be a viable proposition there will need to be sufficient people willing to ‘give it a go’ so as to make a good collective noise and to allow those who are less confident about singing to have the support of a goodly number singing around them. I use the word ‘singing’ advisedly.

Gastro Jaunts around East Anglia (part 4):

“This month we went on a jaunt to one of our favourite coastal towns Hunstanton. Our first meal was at ‘The Terrace’ a small restaurant in the middle of town where Wednesday Night is Tapas night, not just Spanish dishes other meze type dishes are included. They don’t have a drinks licence, so you have to take your own tittle for which they charge £3 per bottle corkage. We had 9 plates of tapas including 2 dessert tapas. The standout dish for us was the beetroot Falafel (a sort of spicy veggie meatball) we were outside on the terrace on one of the hottest nights of the year. The bill came to about £60 but obviously didn’t include drinks, nice atmosphere, nice evening.

Next evening, we went for posh fish and chips at ‘Henry’s’. Don’t be deceived as we were, the benches outside are for the takeaway customers. You eat inside the very nicely decorated air-conditioned restaurant. It was quite busy, but the service was quick and with a smile. I had 6 crispy cod loin bites and Chas had salt and pepper squid both were served with a good side salad; I had a pint of cider and madam had a large glass of vino (Henry’s HAS a drinks licence). All this for less than £30. Another nice evening.

We stayed at the ‘Golden Lion Hotel’ where we have stayed before and always found it good. However, it is now a “Pet Friendly” hotel, so if you like being surrounded by yappy dogs this is the hotel for you. We don’t and won’t be staying there again. “

MIA: **Alderney.** They are of course the four 'Channel Islands'. The only part of England occupied in WW2
