



The Music Club:

"Everyday I have the blues.

'The Blues' – two short words that convey a feeling that might otherwise be much more difficult to express. But what exactly are the blues? I mean, we don't have the reds or the browns or the greens so why the blues?

There is a perception that all blues are sad – "My baby's gone and left me" type songs, but many other genres such as rock, country and jazz are infused with the blues and are much more uplifting. In music, the 'blues' refers to a particular chord structure, usually either 12 or 16 bars long, which may be in a major or minor key. It was left to Music Club members to interpret the theme 'Everyday I have the blues' for their April meeting.

The top five most popular tracks on the day were as follows:

- 1. 'Baby Please Don't Go' performed by John Lee Hooker / Van Morrison. (90 votes)
- 2=. 'St Louis Blues' performed by Glenn Miller. (89 votes)
- 2=. 'Make Your Own Kind of Music' performed by Mama Cass Elliot. (89 Votes)
- 4. 'The Blues Are Alive and Well' performed by Buddy Guy. (87 votes)
- 5. 'Every Day I Have the Blues' performed by Eric Clapton. (85 votes)

The Club is open to all Shed Members to either bring along their own tracks to play or just to listen to the selections of others. The next listening session will be on Wednesday May 3rd in the back room off the Bar (the door next to the pool table). There is no additional charge other than the usual £2 Shed sub payable in the social room. The optional theme for the month is 'Made in Britain.' We are a very friendly group and always are pleased to welcome new members."

The Shanty Group:

"Shanties at the Shed.

This month the Shanty Group started to get to grips with two new songs. "Waiting for the Day" is a song that originated in Essex and concerns an old and tattered coastal barge used to carry coal from Hull to Harwich. Termed a 'pump shanty' it provided a steady rhythm against which to operate a see-saw pump. As is often the case in sea shanties things don't end well – the barge sinks!

Our second, and most adventurous song to date is 'Eliza Lee.' This shanty dates to the time when steam was beginning to replace sail. The song pays homage to the Margaret Evans, an American packet ship built in New York in 1846 that sailed passengers and cargo to New York from London, Liverpool, and other British ports. The ship was severely damaged in 1865 while at anchor in New York when the steamer Bridgeport collided with it. (No, it didn't sink but was so severely damaged that it was subsequently dismantled!) It is a challenging song to learn, but it will not be long before it is added to our repertoire.

We have recently been donated a button accordion (like the squeeze box you see and hear in Captain Pugwash!); however, we don't have anyone who can play it. If you would like to have a go at it, please let me know. You can borrow it and see how you get with no commitment to accompanying the shanty group. Encouragingly, the group has been offered a few gigs. We have accepted an opportunity to sing at a private party in August and have three potential opportunities to sing in May. We may also be able to sing at the Watton Carnival in September.

We are always pleased to welcome new members to the shanty group. You don't have to be able to sing well but you do need a sense of humour! There is no additional charge other than the usual £2 Shed sub payable in the social room. The next sessions will be on Monday 1st May and Wednesday 19th May 2023 in the back room behind the bar starting as soon as possible after 10 o'clock."

Congratulations to Month 3 Winners: All winning photos attached. In order of their label not in order of winners Mark was the clear Gold winner this month and in his first month too, Graeme came a close second and took the Silver and I, Stewart, took Bronze.

The Stats...

Entries - 9 members

Voting - 8 members voted.

Thus, a total of 48 points awarded across the 18 entries.

Of the 18 entries, a total of 13 received at least one vote.

The winning photos accounted for 29 Points - 60% of Voting (2x Colour and 1x B & W)1x Gold, 1x Silver and 1x Bronze awarded.

Gastro Jaunts around East Anglia Part 7

After a bit of a break, I've had a jaunt this month, I went with my wife to Norwich for my first visit in a long time. We had lunch at Paolo's restaurant just opposite the town hall. This is a real Italian restaurant (not one of your pizza and pasta franchises).

We had a table by the window so that we could watch the world go by. It has a nice, homely atmosphere and the waitress (I think she was the chef's wife) was very welcoming.

For starters we shared a dish of whitebait which was one of the best I've eaten, nice plump fish in the lightest of batters. For main course we had the special of the day from the blackboard, ravioli stuffed with prawns and scallops, they were excellent.

For dessert in Italian restaurants, I usually have tiramisu as it is nearly always differently presented. We have a friend who makes the best tiramisu ever and I mark the tiramisu out of ten in comparison to her ten out of ten and this came in at a very creditable 8 out of ten.

So, all in all a very pleasant lunch, in a restaurant I would highly recommend.
