


In summary the weather was glorious, company quite scintillating and many of the Photographs were fantastic.

Gastro Jaunts around East Anglia Part 9

I know that the Gunton Arms has been voted the best gastropub with rooms in the country, however I would say it is more a country house hotel that has a pub style bar. It has some nice dining rooms and serves as an art gallery for the owner a certain Mr Ivor Braka, a wealthy (obviously) contemporary art dealer. He is keen on Tracy Emin and Damian Hurst, I think they are a couple of con artists who have struck lucky in finding clients with more money than sense, I'm reminded of the Danny Kay song the Emperor's New Clothes.

Back to the Gunton Arms, having spent a lovely sunny afternoon strolling along Cromer Pier. We took the short journey to Thorpe Market and arrived at the pub set in a 1000-acre deer park (pub with beer garden!) and checked in for the night.

We retired to the pub bar, but this was a real let down, they've installed a pool table since we were last there and it was quite rowdy. Luckily, there were some cosy snug rooms for residents, so we moved into one of them to finish off the evening. We had a lovely room with a very comfy bed overlooking the deer park, overall, a very nice short break.

The Happy Shopper:

I'd like to introduce you to my brand new Okatsune gardening shears.

Be warned these shears are frighteningly sharp, they have Izumo steel blades (same as Japanese swords). The handles are made of Japanese oak, and they weigh only 800g (28oz).

I can tell you now that these shears are outstanding, if you have box hedges and lawn like I do these are just a godsend (I can't comment about other hedge types). They cut like a knife through warm butter, with all but zero effort from the user.

The slight downside is that they come with a hefty price tag of £90 but rest assured they are worth every single penny, you will never use a better pair of shears.
