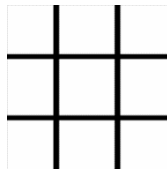

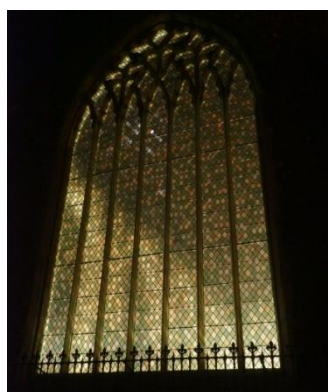

A members view of the whinging younger generation verses retirees:

“The privileged generations should stop moaning about how difficult and stressful life is generally and how fortunate existing pensioners are! They should reflect that little compensates for getting old and infirm!

Us oldies worked hard all our lives for our money, even Saturdays – remember the 48-hour week, post war austerity, rationing and later massive inflation with mortgages of 15% plus for a time.

We saved for our retirement, often without holidays and other luxuries through the difficult 1950’s, 60’s, 70’s. Back then we could not afford new things like car ownership, foreign holidays, mobile phones, large flat-screen televisions etc., or expect much in the way of hand-outs. Second-hand was the norm for furnishing the home. Central heating was a hot-water bottle and a jumper!

We did not purchase items until we had saved enough, nor looked to blame or whinge to all and sundry for life’s short comings. If necessary, we got on our bikes to find a job to pay our way.

Importantly not all pensioners will get the supposedly much publicized full £200 a week state pension or other social benefits that some healthy younger idlers somehow manage to eke out of the welfare system, without hardly ever having paid a penny in taxes.

To top it all the UK’s state pension is one of the lowest in Europe and some pensioners pride and self-reliance stops them claiming entitled pension credit and as a result experience real hardship.”
