The March Outing: Lavenham – 25th March

“We had three cars, Al Middleton, Grahame Andrews and Stewart Haile kindly drove. The weather was glorious, bright blue skies but with a very chilling wind.

There are numerous cafes in Lavenham but the one I chose was closed so we just popped into Chilli & Chives, literally next door. Excellent food and drink but oh so expensive.

After suitable refreshments, we left the café and naturally dispersed into smaller groups so as to wander through the village. It really is like taking a step back in time. It is nestled in the heart of the Suffolk countryside and surrounded by ancient woodlands and rolling countryside, Lavenham is one of the most important and best-preserved Medieval villages in England. It has tiny streets lined with timber-framed buildings, and over 300 listed buildings, some dating back to the 14th Century. A street photographers paradise, if you will, despite too many parked cars blocking that perfect image

Lunch was booked for 14:30, however in the meantime some of us sort warmth in the Cock Pub, as the day was bright but bitterly cold. “The purpose of this workshop is to build upon the recent evening get together where we discussed the “Exposure Triangle” or “A Bucket & Three Taps” as a way of getting the correct exposure. We also referenced the importance of reading the camera’s tonal histogram of the scene as captured by the camera based on the settings of the camera at the time.

This an opportunity to work as a group with our cameras, take photographs and look at the impact that settings can have on the outcome of a photograph. Particularly, we’ll use exposure compensation, focussing as well as setting white balance to get the best out of a camera.”
